Three teachers receive INSPIRE: Lexmark's Teaching Award

Cox has been described as a teacher who is an inspiration not only to her students, but to any parent who has a child with learning challenges.

Jay Cloud teaches technology education by using closed-captioned video technology, smart boards and handson computer programs to visualize concepts for his students. Cloud makes science and math relevant to his students through practical application. He has been described as a teacher who puts his students first and helps them to become accomplished learners with relevant skills.

Lexmark presented each teacher with a \$1,000 award. Nine teachers in total will be recognized during the 2011-2012 academic year.

In order to be eligible for the INSPIRE award, a teacher must receive an online nomination as well as two reference letters from students, colleagues, parents, school administrators or community leaders.
